#### > PROJECT SPOTLIGHT: MARYLAND LEAD EVALUATIONS

With support from the Governor's Office of Crime Prevention & Policy (GOCPP), MCRIC and CESAR are conducting a comprehensive evaluation of 7 Law Enforcement Assisted Diversion (LEAD) sites in Maryland. LEAD programs aim to provide assistance to individuals struggling with substance use or mental health disorders, connecting them to care rather than incarceration. The evaluation couples an analysis of program data with stakeholder interviews to generate a deeper understanding of successes, challenges, and opportunities within diversion programs. With this effort, we hope to leverage insights to inform future efforts to connect individuals in crisis to care rather than incarceration, and to equip programs with resources to track program engagement and outcomes to enhance evaluation efforts. # Investigating Racial and Ethnic Disparity Across Prosecutorial Decision-Making Points: A Multi-Site Analysis in Maryland

<u>Funded by Arnold Ventures</u> and utilizing research-practitioner partnerships, Dr. <u>Brian Johnson</u> and his research team are analyzing original data on case processing outcomes, comparing and contrasting discretionary decisions related to initial charges, diversion, charge reductions/plea bargaining, and final sentences from Baltimore City, Montgomery County, & Frederick County. The jurisdictions are led by state's attorneys committed to using data-driven approaches to improve the efficiency and effectiveness of their offices, but each is also unique in its local context and population demographics. A key focus of the research is examining racial and ethnic inequalities in decisions across locales.

#### **Violence Reduction Center: Applying What Works to Stop Gun Violence**

The Violence Reduction Center (VRC), founded by Thomas Abt, is a research center at UMD that focuses on evidence-based processes to reduce violence, especially gun violence, nationally and globally. The VRC convenes stakeholders, encouraging collaboration between academics, policymakers, and practitioners. Recent VRC publications include:

- Applying 'What Works' to Stop Violence & Save Lives synthesizes and translates evidence to address community gun violence in cities across the country.
- <u>Crime, Place, Policy, and Politics</u> examines systematic reviews of place-based anti-crime strategies, discusses the policy implications of this research, and examines the obstacles associated with sharing place-based and other research findings in an era increasingly defined by political polarization.
