What is the SRI?

• An intensive, 8-week, living and learning, cohort model program that provides undergraduates with research internships and professional development that inspire, encourage, and prepare them for graduate training in the social and behavioral sciences.

- Increase their knowledge in a research topic
- Increase their research skills sets
- Provide guidance for graduate school applications
- Provide graduate school success skills

The SRI is BSOS's embodiment of ... "Being the solution to the *world's* great challenges."

- **Improve the science**/research, practices (health & mental health), and knowledge/information that drives policy.
- **Broaden the participation** of individuals from more backgrounds and world views in the research, practice, and policy arenas relevant to the social and behavioral sciences.
- Hence, the SRI is designed to steer more diverse students into careers in which their lived experiences, unique views on critical issues, access to and perspectives on populations that might not otherwise be addressed or reached, etc. so that we **push the science forward and make it more generalizable and applicable to more individuals and communities**.

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
Notable Milestones in the BSOS SRI Program Timeline

- 1999 First cohort 10 students in a 6-week program
- 2007 BSOS SRI expanded to 8 weeks and adopted the *whole-college-commitment* model
- 2008 Provided training to the <u>100th</u> student
- 2016 Provided training to the <u>200th</u> student
- 2020 & 2021 Provided SRI in a virtual format COVID

Dr. Newman is professor and chair in the Department of Hearing and Speech Sciences as well as an Associate Director of the Maryland Language Science Center. Her research focuses on speech perception and language acquisition.

Dr. Marsh is currently an associate professor in SOCY. Her general areas of expertise are the Black middle class, demography, racial residential segregation, and education.





The Application Pool

- 4,513 students have applied to the SRI since 2007. An average of around <u>260</u> students apply each year, but only <u>12</u> are selected (< 5%).
- We receive applications from all over the U.S. and Puerto Rico.
- Between 60% 70% of the applicants are interested in psychology or neuroscience.
- The pool is diverse, but leans heavily towards women, Black/African-Americans, and Hispanic/Latine.





SRI Participant Demographics






Gender by Race (1999-2022) N=282














SRI Participant Demographics

Targeted Students (1999-2022) N=248*




Participants' Home Colleges and Universities





Students Admitted from 183 Colleges/Universities Across the U.S. and Puerto Rico





SRI Participant Home Colleges/Universities University System of Maryland Versus Others, N=282 (1999-2022)








Participants' Distribution within BSOS Departments

Terrorism and the Olympics

Abstract:

In light of the resources and attention devoted to the possibility of a terrorist attack at the upcoming Summer Olympic Games in London, England, START has compiled a background report on the history of terrorism and the Olympics since 1970. We review terrorist attacks that have taken place during the Olympic Games in the host country, as well as those indirectly related to the Olympic Games and similar major sporting events. Bearing in mind that the heightened profile of these events might increase the likelihood of a terrorist attack while the heightened security and surveillance might decrease the likelihood of an attack, we discuss general patterns of terrorism in Olympic host countries at the time of the Games, compared to the same time period the previous year.



The Department of African American Studies honors Dr. Chinyere Osuji, Associate Professor, for being awarded a BSOS DRI Seed Grant for her project, "Noncompliant: Resilience among African Immigrants in the Nursing Profession."

Community -

Dr. Osuji is conducting a study of first- and second-generation African immigrants in the US nursing profession. The project examines how African RNs from across the continent build resilience against stigmatization. With the DRI grant, she will be examining: 1) public discourse around African immigrants in the United States; 2) the extent of anti-Black racism and nativism in the nursing profession; 3) how foreign-born Africans build resilience against stigmatization in nursing school and on the job as RNs; 4) strategies of resilience across first- and second-generation African immigrants. She will be working with Thu Nguyen (School of Public Health) to understand these dynamics on social media.


Gabriela Iveliz Rosa Hernandez, MA


